



In her 1930 East Aurora High School yearbook it was noted "Who shall say what thoughts and visions fill the fiery brains, who shall say what dreams of beauty? Ye whose hearts are fresh and simple speak in tones so plain and childlike you bring back the days departed. Tell me of your adventures and of your many deeds of wonder."

As James Lukose, director of Wayside Cross stated, "Ruth has been a pillar of Wayside Cross Ministries since its beginning in 1928. For the past 87 years of total commitment, she has served as an active board member since 1983 and

a life-time board member since 1990. We are truly grateful for her decades of selfless involvement marked by faithfulness, consistency, compassion and servanthood. Ruth sets a godly example."

Ruth's niece Gayle remarks that, "Aunt Elsie Ruth models love, acceptance, service, kindness, giving and receiving.

She has made her life precious with God's guidance."

Although Ruth has the interest and the positive mental attitude of an 80 year old, Ruth will be 103 on August 7th. Her life has centered on her deep faith, her community

service and her compassion for others. Ruth gave many years of service to the Aurora YWCA. She recalls a Miss Felicia Atkins at the Y on Downer Place and her delicious Gooseberry pie. Ruth was in charge of the Y cafeteria at that time.

Ruth was named a YWCA Woman of Distinction in 1980 and received the Kiwanis "Service to God and Man Award" in 1985.

Ruth's life has been at once resplendent... ever giving.... of quality... and of merit. From serving as an election judge to mentoring students with Bardwell School PTA to the United Way to serving as Grand Marshal of the Montgomery Fest

2003 parade, to Jennings Terrace and Family Counseling Service, Ruth's life has shown light and wisdom while keenly interested in others' well-being.

Annual Campaign Update

hrough the end of May, 1012 people have made 2,386 donations to Wayside Cross Ministries' 87th Annual Campaign. Donations to date are \$588,704, an increase of \$41,870 or 8% over the campaign last year at the same time.

One of the principal reasons for the success of WCM is its wonderful, generous supporters. This generosity has been constant over the years. One indication is that there are 161 people or institutions that have supported WCM every year for at least 20 years.

The Annual Campaign is the largest single fundraiser for WCM and provides about 25% of the funds needed for operations each year. Our six ministries are busy every day helping men, women and children transform their lives.

Our 88th Annual Campaign will kick off in September and we need your support again.

Because You Were Blessed, You Have Been a Blessing to Us!

On January 9, 2015, Ralph Brooker celebrated his 60th spiritual birthday with the men and staff at Wayside. He arranged for his own birthday party and provided ice cream on one of the coldest days of the year. At the conclusion of the celebration, Ralph testified of God's faithfulness and challenged the men to continue steadfast in the faith. He shared a testimony that instilled hope.

When I was ten years old, I realized that alcoholics and drunkards lied and cheated a lot to cover up their actions. I decided then that I was not going to drink after seeing what it was doing to my mother and me.

I left the family farm at 19. I didn't know anyone in the "big city." I got a job and after work to "loosen up" I'd have a beer; it was okay for a while but by the time I realized it was a big mistake, it was too late.

After 12 years of being on my own, I was at rock bottom. It was 1954 and during the course of a year, I lost 28 jobs due to drinking. The guys on the street said, "Go to the Wayside Cross Rescue Mission, they will give you free food and a place to sleep." I asked, "Why would they do that?" The answer was, "So they can preach to you." My answer was, "I don't want any of that."


God had another plan. When I came to the mission I was hopeless, I had run out of everything. Rev. Johannaber took me under his wing like I was his brother, he was so kind, offering a place to stay for nothing. "Why would he do that?" His reply was, "Because we want you to be happy, love the Lord Jesus and trust Him and He will take care of you."

On January 9, 1955, a minister came to preach to the men. As I was listening to him talk about this drunken man I thought, "How did he know about me?" I figured Rev. Johannaber must have told him my story. I was afraid for my life, I wanted to run towards the door, but instead I got up the courage to go to the prayer room and this was my prayer. I was embarrassed, but asked, "The minister said you could deliver drunks, and you could make us new. If you could do that, then do it for me." My prayer was answered.

That day was the most important day of my life. I knew something was different about me. Following the chapel service at Wayside, I accepted Jesus Christ as my Savior, and at the age of 31 my life was forever changed.

In June 1955, Wayside asked me to come on staff. I said I don't know anything about counseling these guys that are old enough to be my grandpa. "No, you'll fit in fine," so I came on staff. It wasn't easy because most of the men were 20 years older than me and they didn't respect me. They called me a young punk, so since we were all in the same situation, I told them I might be dumb but I'm not a punk and they eased up.

Three years later, I met this angel from heaven at Claim Street Baptist Church. Ina Arlene and I were married in November 1956, and by 1959 we had two children. I went to the Superintendent and said, "I guess this mission isn't for me; I can't make it with a wife and two children. I was going to work at Barber Greene but Rev. Johannaber said, "No, no, no, don't go, let me talk with the executive board and I'll get back to you." He came back and said, "The board wants you to stay to be the Assistant Superintendent." I felt in over my head but the Lord led me, and I stayed at Wayside.





In 1966, I was approached by some businessmen who had heard about me on Unshackled (a radio drama series produced by Pacific Garden Mission in Chicago, Illinois), and asked me if I would be interested in running a small mission. I said, "I don't have what it takes, I don't have an education." They said, "You've got what it takes!" So we moved to Saginaw, Michigan, and stayed for three years. As time went on, I knew that I didn't have the education or ability to write letters and raise funds; I was a follower, not a leader. They accepted that and I came back to Aurora.

I worked at Allsteel for a few years and in 1971, Rev. Johannaber needed some help at the mission and I came on as the Men's Senior Supervisor. During that time I counseled many men. I loved the men so much it hurt me to put them out if they didn't toe the line because I knew that they would be back on the streets, so I grounded them. One of the men said, "You can't ground a 75 year old man," and I said, "Watch me!" He was grounded for two weeks, so he would stand at the front door and put half of his body out the door and say, "Hey, Brooker what do you think of this?" I would say, "I think that if you put your other foot out that door you are out of here for two weeks," and with that he pulled it back in. He now knew I meant business. The Lord always helped me with a few ideas to work with the men.

In September 1994, after 25 years, it was time for a change and to usher in the computer age. I was 70 years old and it was time to move on.

Ralph served 29 years on Wayside's staff mainly as Supervisor of the Men's Division. His chief responsibility was counseling the resident men. Though Ralph had no formal education or training, he excelled as a counselor. He identified with the men's plight. Like many of the men who walk through the doors his life had been in crisis.

At the age of 70 Ralph wasn't ready to retire and he didn't; for the last 20 years Ralph has been visiting shut-ins. Ralph is a blessing to many!

God's Blessing

Doug Wants to Bless Others

he story of former Master's Touch resident Doug Stvan epitomizes the ministry's rallying cry: "Collaborate for Christ-centered change!"

Doug was a heroin user for 12 years. Those years comprised legal troubles, health issues (including a life-threatening overdose), and relational breakdowns. Today, he is gainfully employed, taking classes at DePaul University, and has been drugfree for more than four years. He has experienced the transforming power of Jesus Christ.

Doug, who is 34, doesn't think of himself as a "former heroin addict." His identity is in Christ. His favorite Bible verse is 2 Corinthians 5:17: "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come."

The importance of the role of Doug's church (Harvest Bible Chapel, Naperville), and his mentor, Steve Madawick, cannot be overstated when discussing Doug's spiritual transformation. Every former drug user is "one decision away from relapsing," Steve says. As Doug's mentor, Steve sets communication standards for their relationship, and expects transparency and honesty in all of their interactions.

Doug Stvan is thankful beyond words for the mercy and grace with which Our Lord has blessed him. In response, he wants to bless others. To that end, he has returned to Master's Touch as a volunteer mentor. In awe of God's greatness, Doug says, "God is using my greatest failures, my weakest times, to help others. It's just amazing."

She told me, "The food we sent home with them will be all that these people will have for dinner tonight." I remember thinking, "This is all they will have to eat for dinner?" That made such an impression on my young heart.

Throughout the years, life has had its challenges and joys. God was with me as I was raising two little girls as a single parent working outside of the home and then caring for my aging parents for several years. I learned to be thankful for every little thing! When it was time for me to retire in 1994, I knew it was time to give back. When I met Lynda McCann Dorsch at a church function, she invited me to



come to Lifespring to help with secretarial needs they had. Not long after I arrived, a volunteer position for cooking class teacher opened up. Lynda said, "Why not give it a try!" And, that I did, which has lasted now for over 20 years!

I love coming to teach my weekly class with the women at Lifespring. We laugh, pray and sometimes don't even get to the cooking portion of the class. I teach them how to make good meals for their families while saving money. It's important that families learn to sit and enjoy a meal together, to talk about their day and just reflect on all God has given. They ask me what it was like when I was younger; what

was an ice box, how did you wash clothes, what did the cars look like at that time? We just enjoy being together.

My weekly times with the Lifespring women are so rewarding, I can only hope the women receive as much as I have from our times we spend together. I have been so blessed throughout my life; it's a joy to bless others.

George, A Real Blessing

hank you God for George Adamson! George is the Senior Chaplain in the Stateville Correctional Center in Joliet. Stateville is an unusual place and George is an unusual Chaplain. He's an "old biker" and this is one area in which we have commonality. Of course, we both love Jesus, and we both love inmates. When I first met George, he gave me the "five dollar" tour of Stateville (as opposed to the "dollar" tour). I really appreciated the fact that he spent time with me, showing me around this unusual facility. Stateville houses nearly 4,000 maximum security inmates, in one of the largest cellblocks in the world (the "quarter-house"), and in the only panopticon (roundhouse cell block) in the world.

Another unit of Stateville is the Northern Reception Center (NRC), through which pass 10,000+ inmates per year. Under God, George is primarily responsible for us starting (in 2009) our Stateville Saturday's literature-distribution ministry in the NRC, an incredibly fruitful ministry providing opportunities for over 100 volunteers! When we started our weekly DADS CLASSES at Stateville (in 2011), George

suggested we also develop the DADS CLASSES into a two-day DADS SEMINAR. This has been a real blessing, opening doors for over 200 volunteers into all the Illinois State and Federal Prisons. Just recently, in the (former) program-less NRC, we began holding a two-day seminar every month! So, I thank God for blessing us with a friend in Chaplain George Adamson, so we can be a blessing to 10s of 1,000s of inmates!



While we have hundreds of volunteers involved reaching these 10s of 1,000s of inmates, we have room for literally hundreds more volunteers! The harvest is plentiful! More laborers are needed! Please contact Chaplain Tom today at tbeatty@waysidecross.org.

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


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
