

International Volunteer Travels to Great Lengths to Help the Homeless

Lena Jakobi started volunteering at a food pantry last March in her homeland of Germany. Her parents didn't tell her she had to and it wasn't a requirement at her school. She just felt that she wanted to do something to help people. She heard about the pantry, or "tafel," and would have liked to donate money or food but didn't have the resources to do so. "I don't go to work so I can't give donations very well, so I decided to work there as a *donation*," Jakobi said. After a few months, the tafel closed for the summer and with a break before her university classes resumed, Jakobi decided to come to the United States and see how similar organizations work here.



Her mother's friend knew Pastor Jonathan Wilson, who leads Bible study at the Elgin Wayside Center. Arrangements were made for Lena to stay with the Wilsons and volunteer at the Wayside Center.

Jakobi arrived in Elgin Aug. 11 and stayed until Sept. 7, working at Wayside Monday through Friday for the

duration of her trip. She helped serve breakfast and lunch each day, input data into the Wayside computer system and sort clothes. She has also participated in the women's and group Bible study sessions.

Homberger Tafel opens to give out food just once each day — it does not provide daylong services like Wayside, and the food is not served as a meal. Individuals are given food they can cook at home. But sometimes donations are not enough to meet the need at the tafel. Then Jakobi has to say no, or say she can only give smaller amounts of food.

"That's what I like here (at Wayside)," Jakobi said. "You don't have to say no.

You prepare breakfast and lunch and you can give as much as you want because there's always enough." Jakobi has been amazed by the amount of donations and their variety at Wayside.

Friendship Dinner Report

Unprompted, nearly everyone rose to their feet simultaneously as the Chicago Tabernacle Choir sang their final worship anthem. About the same time, a dinner attendee leaned to a friend and remarked, *I feel like we are in Heaven*. An evening that started with a beef and chicken dinner was now feeding the souls of those who had taken the time out of their schedule to be present.



On the evening of October 25, over 300 people gathered for Wayside's Annual Friendship Dinner in downtown Elgin. After dinner, the Chicago Tabernacle choir, led by Chrissy Toledo, made their way to the platform. With Moody radio personality Mark Elfstrand as M.C., stories were then shared of how lives are being touched by the Wayside Center. A video presentation was shown of one young lady, though coming from a life of abuse and confusion,



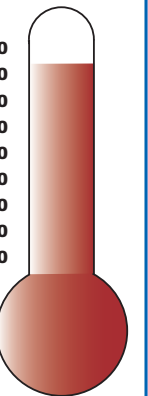
was able to find God and direction at Wayside. In another presentation, a professor and his wife from a local Christian University shared how the volunteers and staff at Wayside were instrumental in helping

them adopt a baby from two of our homeless guests. While the Wayside Center often helps people out of homelessness, in this instance a young life was spared from ever entering it. Following the ministry report, the highlight of the evening for many was the presentation by Bill Rieser. Bill shared his life story, beginning with a fatherless childhood full of abuse and anger; teen years with a mixture of sports and painful experiences; and an adulthood of addiction followed by redemption and transformation.

For days following the dinner, guests called, emailed, and sent letters to the staff of the center thanking them for organizing a wonderful dinner gathering. Only heaven will reveal the true impact of the evening, but many guests that evening were able to come to terms with their own struggles with sin, their own hurts from the past, and their need for dependence upon the Lord Jesus. While guests came expecting to give, the Lord returned to so many in attendance a cup that ran over.

DuPage Initiative Launches

Modeled after the Elgin Wayside Center, DuPage County area churches are joining forces to launch Wayside DuPage just in time for the cold weather months. The center will offer a safe haven and warming center two days a week at Peoples Community Church on Park Boulevard in Glen Ellyn. Volunteers are needed to provide

- Churches willing to sponsor, walk alongside, pray for, and encourage a homeless individual or family

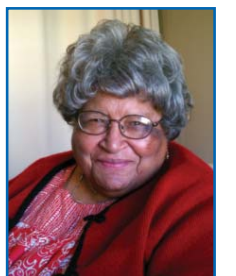


Barb Waddle Recognized for Outstanding Service
